Para. 1 Tuareg – the Travelling People

Tribal lifestyle has always been fascinating for people living in urban locations. The life of the Sahara Desert nomads such as the Tuareg tribe for instance is very different to the life of city people. So, what does this tribal lifestyle look like? How do the Tuareg, or the Sahara nomads, actually live? Early travellers' stories often referred to them as the 'blue men of the Sahara Desert', because the Tuareg men are known for covering their faces with a dark blue cloth. And sadly, that is the extent of many people's knowledge of the Tuareg. So let's look at their tribal lifestyle and learn more about the life of the nomads of the Sahara.

Para. 2 Who are the Tuareg?

The Tuareg are a substantial ethnic population that crosses the boundaries of several countries, but cannot trace their GAP _____ back to any one specific country. The Tuareg call themselves Imohag, which means 'free men'. The language of the Tuareg is called Tamacheq, and they use a written script known as Tifinagh. They lead a semi-nomadic life across the Sahara in the North African countries of Mali, Niger, Libya, Algeria and Chad. Semi-nomadic means that they travel a lot, but they also have homes and lands in which they grow crops. In the old days, Tuareg society was divided between those who cultivated the land and those who did not, as looking after the land was considered the work of the lower classes, while the upper classes worked in trading. However, that changed over time as trading opportunities became significantly limited.

Para. 3 _____

Part of the Berber group of people, the Tuareg have lived in extreme conditions in the heart of the Sahara for over a thousand years. At the beginning of the 14th century, trade routes to the profitable salt, gold and ivory markets between North Africa, Europe, and the Middle East appeared across Tuareg territory. With extensive knowledge of the Sahara, the Tuareg began to work alongside the traders, quickly dominating and controlling these routes.

After a number of nation-states were set up in the region in the early 1960s, Governments started to put in place restrictions on trade with neighbouring countries. This was done in order to protect national economic interests. GAP _____, the Tuareg started to lose economic strength and political power.



Para. 4 The legend of the veil

The most famous aspect of the Tuareg men and the most mysterious one is the blue veil. Tuareg men begin wearing a veil at the age of 25. This veil covers up the entire face except the eyes. It is almost never removed, even in front of family members. It is commonly believed that men began wearing the veil to protect their faces from the Sahara sands. GAP _____, why it has become so significant is unknown.

Para. 5 Tuareg marriage

Tuareg men often write beautiful poems, and try to gain the women's affections in many other ways. This is largely because the end decision rests with the women themselves. When a woman finally says 'yes', they start preparing for the wedding, which is a week-long event. When a woman gets married, her female family members usually give her a tent as a gift. The bride often keeps that tent all her life. The Tuareg believe that the house belongs to the woman. The woman also owns the family's livestock. That might be because the men travel a lot. And because they travel a lot, men highly value their camels and swords, which they consider their most valuable possessions.

Para. 6 The life of the tribe

The Tuareg mostly live in tents. They make tent-like homes by setting up wooden posts and then covering the posts with fabric. To help cool down these houses and to keep the desert sand from getting inside, they put straw mats on the inside of the fabric walls. The Tuareg believe in educating all the members of their tribe. All the children are taught how to read and the teachings of the Quran. One of the significant sources of income for the Tuareg is selling their art and handicrafts, which are mostly in the form of jewellery, leather and metal saddle decorations, as well as beautifully crafted swords.

Para. 7 Tuareg food

The Tuareg do not eat meat often. They are not vegetarians, it is just that livestock is very precious. They only eat meat on special occasions, like festivals and weddings. They substitute meat with eating a lot of non-meat protein, such as milk and cheese. Their diet GAP _____ a lot of dates and melon as well. Sometimes, on special occasions, they consume a drink called eghajira, which is created by pounded millet (a type of cereal), dates and cheese mixed with water.

Text A - Growing in Small Spaces

No garden is too small for a tree. OK, a huge oak tree on your balcony may not be the best choice, but there's a wide range of small flowering trees, including fruit trees, that are suitable for small spaces. Choosing the right tree for a small garden is very important.

Height? This is probably the most important factor. Even small trees may, over time, reach a height of 6-8 metres or more. If this is too high, consider a dwarf variety. These only grow to 2-3m.

All year interest? Think about when you want your tree to look good. Think about flowering time, leaves, and fruit. If you only have room for one tree, look for a deciduous one that'll look nice all year round, such as one with lovely autumn colours following summer flowers. Just remember that you won't get this GAP 1) _____ from an evergreen tree.

When to buy trees and shrubs? Autumn is a great time to buy and plant a new tree or shrub. However if pushed for time, you can plant at any time until early spring as long as the soil is dry enough to work (if it sticks to your boots or tools it is too wet). Container-grown trees and shrubs can be planted at more or less any time of year, but need thorough, regular watering after planting to GAP 2) _____ good root establishment. If planted in spring or summer it can be very challenging to keep them alive during hot, dry spells.

Text B - Everything is bigger in America

The General Sherman is a giant sequoia tree from California in the USA. By size, it is the largest known living tree on Earth. The naturalist James Wolverton named the tree in 1879 after General William Sherman. Wolverton had been in the army with General Sherman in the American Civil War.

GAP 1) _____ the General Sherman is the largest currently living tree, it is not the largest tree ever recorded. The Crannell Creek Giant, a coastal redwood near Trinidad, California, is estimated to have been 15 to 25% larger than the General Sherman. That tree was cut down in the mid-1940s.

In 2017 one of the branches fell off the General Sherman. The branch was bigger than an average tree. It caused a lot of damage to nearby fences and pavements but luckily no one was hurt. Such events are not thought to GAP 2) _____ any problems with the tree's health. In fact, one of the theories is that it could actually be a natural defence mechanism against adverse weather, although some scientists hold a different opinion.



Text C - Grow what you eat

If you have a garden and want to grow lots of free food, then plant a fruit tree. If you have to choose one tree, then I suggest the Victoria plum. This produces enormous crops of juicy fruit. It has pink-red skin with yellow flesh inside. It's great eaten fresh and even better cooked. Victoria plums have stood the test of time. They were first found in a Sussex garden in 1805 and introduced to other gardens from the 1840s. It has won lots of awards for its great taste. Today, it is the variety most widely grown by the UK's commercial plum growers.

One problem is that it can have too much fruit and its branches can snap under the weight! So simply support or prop up the branches up to avoid them breaking. They can also be attacked by the plum moth which spoils the fruit, but this is very rare and easily avoided. All you need to do is leave some other food near the tree to GAP 1) _____ the moths and they won't bother with the plums.
